	 Moses Akatugba – the good news of his unconditional pardon and release has been partly attributed by the Governor to Al's campaign. His letter of thanks is now on the display board in the Cathedral cloisters. [letter published in the Salisbury Journal] Ali Aarrass – the case is undergoing investigation by the police in the Philippines, and the Senate are to open an enquiry into widespread abuse Claudia Medina – all charges have been dropped and she is now free. Dilorom Abdukadirova – thanks from the family have been received by Al. The case continues. 					
	 AIHQ have sent a list of possible prisoners but have not identified a particular one, or said that the group would need to pick one from this list. It was agreed that the current campaigns (HRA and Torture, together with the Magna Carta coverage) are extremely time-consuming. The group of active members is now also smaller. - The Talk at the Playhouse at 2.00 pm in the afternoon. Edward Fox will be reading passages from the Magna Carta, together with a general panel discussion with Kate Allen, Prof Guy Standing and Ben Rawlence. The event will be for 1½ hours. So far, ticket sales are modest, but the Playhouse hopes they will increase over the last couple of days. The 11th June edition of the Salisbury Journal carried an article on the event but – regrettably – opportunities to

publicise it further have been missed.

The display in the Cloisters continues, but attendance has revealed little interest in our, or indeed any of the stands. The exhibits are too far apart and most visitors seem more interested in taking photos of the spire, and walk past the display and the video.

- The Human Rights Act this will be a major focus for the Group but we need more information on the Government's plans. (The Act was not included in the Queen's Speech).

In the meantime, the website RightsInfo provides useful information on the myths surrounding the Act, and how they might be countered, as well as ideas for possible events. It was agreed that the AI suggestion of an 'Amnestea' would be likely to attract only the

'already converted'.
